The White County Steering Committee A met on April 4th, 2022, at the White County Courthouse. **Members of Committee A include Commissioners Dakota White, Chairman, T.K. Austin, V. Chairman, Robert McCormick, Secretary, Stanley Neal, Andy Haston, Roger Mason, & Dale Bennett.**

Steering A Chairman White, called the meeting to order and requested roll call. Members present included, T.K. Austin, Secretary, Robert McCormick, Andy Haston, Roger Mason, and Stanley Neal. Absent was Commissioner, Dale Bennett. Also, present was Executive Assistant, Brooke Luna & Ashlyn Hanna. Also present at the meeting were several members of the community. There being a quorum the meeting was called to order. Prayer was led by Commissioner Neal.

Approval of March 7th Steering A Report

Chairman White asked for review and approval of the Minutes from the March 7th meeting. With no discussion, Commissioner Austin made a motion to approve the Minutes as presented and Commissioner McCormick seconded the motion; with no objections the motion was approved.

Update on Roads Subcommittee

Chairman White shared with the committee that the roads subcommittee had met but no action was taken at this time.

Discussion on Bon Air Historical Museum Storage Quote

Chairman White shared with the committee that the Historical Museum is losing its current storage facility at Bondecroft Elementary School. Mr. White presented a quote from an out-of-town business on a storage shed. Commissioner Mason stated he feels that we should get a quote from a local company. Mr. White shared that the storage shed was being torn down this month so they needed it quickly. Mr. Austin made a motion to send the quote to the budget committee for approval and the amount to not exceed \$5,630. Mr. McCormick seconded the approval; with no objections the motion was approved.

Recess as Steering A & Do Business as Parks & Rec

Chairman White asked for a motion to recess Steering Committee A to do business as Parks & Recreation Board. Commissioner Haston made a motion to recess; seconded by Commissioner McCormick. With no objections the motion was approved.

Parks & Rec Business

There was discussion on the difference between the Parks & Rec Board & Parks & Rec subcommittee but no action was taken. Mr. Mason shared that there had been an issue with the resurfacing with the basketball courts, but they are in the process of getting that repaired. There was no old or new business to discuss. Mr. Haston made a motion to adjourn doing business as Parks & Rec and reconvene as Steering Committee A; seconded by Mr. Robert McCormick. With no objections the motion was approved.

Old Business

Chairman White opened the floor for old business. Commissioner Neal shared with the committee that there had been discussion previously about the White County Recreational Park being named in honor or recognition of former White County citizen, Mr. David Culley. He shared that Mr. Culley has had great success as a long-time coach in the NFL in addition to serving as the head coach to the Houston Texans. Commissioner Neal made a motion to rename the White County Recreational Complex after David Culley, seconded by T.K. Austin; with no objections the motion was approved. There was no other business to discuss.

New Business

Chairman White opened the floor for new business. Commissioner Neal shared with the committee that in honor of a local life time resident make the forty-man roster of the Chicago cubs he would like to make a motion to ask the County Executive to send a letter of recommendation to the White County school requesting they name the White County High School Baseball Field House be changed to Ethan Roberts Field House, seconded by Mr. Austin; with no objections the motion was approved.

White County Steering Committee B met on Monday, April 4, 2022 at the White County Courthouse. Members of Committee B include White County Commissioners Kyle Goff, Chairman, Cain Rogers, Vice Chairman, Lanny Selby, Secretary, Terry Alley, Lonnie Crouch, Dillard Quick and Lee Broyles.

Agenda Items #1 - #3 – Call to Order – Roll Call – Prayer

Commissioner Goff, Chairman called the meeting to order at 5:30pm followed by roll call. Members present were, Commissioners, Selby, Crouch, Quick, Goff and Rogers. Also, in attendance were Executive Denny Wayne Robinson and Chad Marcum, Finance Director

Absent from the meeting was, Commissioners, Alley and Broyles.

There being a quorum present Chairman Goff requested opening prayer led by Commissioner Selby.

Agenda Item #4 – Approval of Minutes from March 2022 Steering B Meeting

Chairman Goff requested review and discussion of the March 2022 Steering Committee B Report. Commissioner Rogers made a motion to approve the Report as presented, seconded by Commissioner Crouch; none opposed, motion was approved.

Agenda Item #5 – Approval of ADA Transition Plan Resolution

Chairman Goff opened the floor for discussion of the ADA Transition Plan. Executive Robinson presented a packet outlining the itemized list for each of the county owned properties/buildings and what corrections or improvements would need to be made in order for meet ADA requirements. Executive Robinson stated that the county would not have to make all of the changes immediately, however, as future repairs, improvements, etc. are made, ADA requirements would be met. As of March 2022, the estimated cost for ADA compliance for all properties/buildings owned/operated by the WC Government is approximately \$797,685. The WC Human Resource Dept. has overseen the inventory process and the needs based on ADA requirements set forth by TDOT. Additionally, Executive Robinson stated that White County received a grant for fire safety that will allow new fire/evacuation equipment to be installed in the WC Courthouse. With grant funds, strobe lights for hearing impaired will be installed. Commissioner Crouch made a motion to approve the ADA Transition Plan and send it to full court for final approval, motion seconded by Commissioner Selby, none opposed and motion passed.

Agenda Item #6 – Discussion on WC Courthouse Elevator

Chairman Goff opened the floor for discussion on item #6, WC Courthouse Elevator. Executive Robinson stated that the elevator at the WC Courthouse has had mechanical issues and considering the age of the elevator parts were becoming obsolete. Executive Robinson has met with, or spoken to OTIS and Nashville Elevator several times over the past four years, and understands that their recommendations is to replace the elevator. It is estimated that upgrades to the current elevator could cost as much as fifty thousand (\$50,000) or more, however it is believed that the current elevator shaft is in good working condition and may possibly be used, saving some money. State of TN requires an official engineer study be done on the mechanics and operation of elevators as a first step. The County will comply with the recommendation and guidelines set forth by the state in order to have the elevator permitted. Executive Robinson is uncertain, at this time, what the exact cost will be for the engineering study but suggested that money from APR funds be earmarked for this necessary project. Commissioner Rogers made a motion to send the matter to members of the Budget Committee with a recommendation to earmark fifty-thousand (\$50k) for elevator rehab at WC Courthouse, the motion was seconded by Commissioner Selby, with none opposed the motion was approved.

Agenda Item #7 – Old Business

Chairman Goff opened the floor for any old business. Chad Marcum, Finance Director addressed the committee and stated that he recently attended a meeting with TDEC regarding eligible expenses and requirements for the ARP (American Rescue Plan) funds. Marcum stated that APR funds, allocated for infrastructure, broadband and utilities were discussed and recommended that \$615,000 ARP funds be used as a match and distributed among four (4) utility districts in White County. Commissioner Rogers made a motion to send the matter to members of the Budget Committee with the recommendation that \$615,000 be used as match for the four utility districts in White County, seconded by Commissioner Crouch, none opposed and the motion was approved.

Chairman Goff updated members regarding issues with the flooring project at the WC History Museum. Goff stated that he personally has met with two (2) local floor installers who would not accept the job due to the excessive labor required in moving the heavy displays and counters in the building. Additionally, the previous quote that was submitted to the committee months ago was vague and didn't include labor costs. Goff stated that he will get an updated quote(s) for materials and labor to present by the next meeting, and meet with potential laborers/installers and clarify what the project will require.

Agenda Item #8 – New Business

Chairman Goff opened the floor for any new business. Commissioner Crouch raised the question as to how the surrounding counties structured their pay scale for elected officials (councils / commissioners). Additionally, Crouch recommended that the committee research the pay scales in which officials (commissioners) are paid per month and best practices on how to handle excessive absenteeism or lack of participation from county elected county officials

(commissioners). Executive Robinson stated that the Oversight Committee was in place to review policies and make recommendations to the legislative body. Commissioner Crouch made a motion to send the matter to the Oversight Committee with the recommendation that they research the pay structure of other counties and attendance policies for Commissioners.

With no further questions or comments, Chairman Goff announced upcoming meetings for the White County Board of Commissioners.

The White County Solid Waste committee met Monday, April 4th, 2022 at the White County Courthouse. **Members of Solid Waste Committee are Commissioners Dillard Quick, Chairman, Andy Haston, T.K. Austin, Lanny Selby, Roger Mason, Kyle Goff, and Robert McCormick.**

Chairman Quick requested roll call of committee members. With none absent, present were Commissioners Quick, Goff, Selby, Haston, McCormick, Austin, and Mason. Also, present were County Executive, Denny W. Robinson, Solid Waste Interim Director, Kelly Lafever. Present from the community were citizens Connie Davis, Derrick Hutchings, other residents not identified. There being a quorum, the meeting was called to order.

Approval of March 7th, 2022 Report

Chairman Quick opened the floor by requesting review, discussion, and approval of the Minutes from the March 7th, 2022 Solid Waste meeting. With no discussion, Commissioner Selby made a motion and Commissioner Haston seconded the motion to approve the Minutes as presented. With no objections the motion was approved.

Solid Waste Director's Report

Chairman Quick requested the Directors report from Solid Waste Interim Director, Kelly Lafever. Ms. Lafever stated that there were no new updates at this time other than they are needing drivers at this time.

Engineer's Report

Chairman Quick opened the floor to Executive Robinson for the Engineer's report. Executive Robinson shared the following report:

Class I Annual Engineering Report & Expansion Area Permitting

TriAD is preparing the annual engineering report based on the December 2021 survey by Vick Surveying. The annual report is due to TDEC by May 1, 2022. TriAD is revising the Class I expansion permit application based on recent conversations with the Cookeville Environmental Field Office. To expedite the permitting process, TriAD is revising the seasonal high potentiometric surface map and associated landfill base grades per TDEC's request rather than continue to investigate and monitor groundwater elevations to justify a lower base cell grade. A future modification to the base grades may be made in a second permitting event using additional groundwater information obtained throughout the cell construction process.

Old Business: There was none.

New Business: There was none.

Budget Committee Meeting

The White County Budget Committee met on Monday, April 4, 2022 following the Solid Waste Committee at the White County Courthouse. Members present were Mr. Stanley Neal, Mr. Kyle Goff, Mr. Denny Wayne Robinson, Mr. Dakota White, and Mr. TK Austin. Also present were Mr. Chad Marcum, Mr. Wayne Mullican, Ms. Geta McMillan, Ms. Suzi Cash Haston, Mr. Robert McCormick, Mr. J.D. Humphrey, Mr. Derrick Hutchins, and Ms. Connie Davis.

There being a quorum present, the meeting was called to order by Mr. Robinson.

Mr. Robinson asked for approval of the minutes from the March 7, 2022 meeting. Mr. Austin made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to approve the minutes as presented. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Robinson recognized Ms. Suzi Cash Haston with the White County 911 Emergency Communications District for a brief presentation regarding their request for an increase in funding. According to Ms. Haston, White County and the City of Sparta have contributed the same amount to 911 for 20 years. The district is requesting that those amounts be increased under the current county and city agreement to split contributions on a 75%/25% basis. Ms. Haston indicated that they are also having conversations with the City of Sparta regarding funding. The committee thanked Ms. Haston and the 911 board members present, and took the request under advisement for consideration in the FY 2023 budget.

The committee considered three (3) General Fund amendments as follows.

1. Judicial Commissioners - \$2,692 for one-month part-time judicial commissioners
2. County Buildings - \$2,500 for email platform licenses
3. Jail - \$6,976 to increase inmate medical services for remainder of fiscal year

Mr. White made a motion and Mr. Goff seconded the motion to approve the budget amendments as presented, and recommend their passage by the full county commission. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

The committee considered five (5) General Fund line-item amendments as follows:

1. Register of Deeds - \$5,000 to reallocate funds for office supplies
2. Chancery Court - \$103 to reallocate funds for dues and memberships
3. EMA - \$350 to reallocate funds for communications charges
4. Veteran's Services - \$1,250 to reallocate funds for communication and office supplies
5. Animal Control - \$1,500 to supplement funds already appropriated for a lawn mower

Mr. Goff made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to approve the amendments as presented. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

The committee considered a Central Cafeteria Fund amendment in the amount of \$60,000 to appropriate grant funds received for the purchase of a new serving line at BonDeCroft Elementary School. Mr. Neal

made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to approve the amendment as presented and recommend its passage by the full county commission, contingent upon school board approval. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

The committee considered a General Purpose School Fund amendment in the amount of \$2,700 to appropriate a donation received from Farm and Forest Families of Tennessee for the Family Resource Program. Mr. Austin made a motion and Mr. Neal seconded the motion to approve the amendment as presented and recommend its passage by the full county commission, contingent upon school board approval. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

The committee considered five (5) School Federal Projects Fund amendments as follows:

1. Title II, Subfund 201 - \$4,500 to transfer funds for travel expenses
2. Perkins Basic, Subfund 801 - \$5,893.29 to reallocate funds at fiscal year end
3. ESSER 2.0, Subfund 933 - \$11,000 to reallocate funds due to personnel changes
4. Epidemiology & Laboratory Capacity, Subfund 940 - \$100,830 for clinic supplies
5. Career Pathways, Subfund 951 - \$16,852.29 for vocational equipment

Mr. Neal made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to approve the amendments as presented, contingent upon school board approval. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

The committee considered a FY 2022 School Federal Projects Fund original budget for a Fiscal Pre-Monitoring Grant in Subfund 935 in the amount of \$46,200. Mr. White made a motion and Mr. Goff seconded the motion to approve the budget as presented, contingent upon school board approval. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Robinson asked the committee for any old business: There was none.

Mr. Robinson asked the committee for any new business:

Coming from Steering Committee A, the Bon Air Historical Society is requesting \$5,630 for the purchase of a small storage building to be placed at the Bon Air Museum. Mr. White made a motion and Mr. Austin seconded the motion to appropriate \$5,630 for the purchase of a storage building, with the stipulation that the building be purchased from a White County business. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Coming from Steering Committee B, the elevator in the White County Courthouse is in dire need of rehabilitation due to its age, condition, and accessibility issues. It is recommended that \$50,000 be appropriated for engineering to study and develop a plan to move forward on the rehabilitation. Mr. Austin made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to appropriate \$50,000 toward an engineering study for the rehabilitation of the elevator. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Coming from Steering Committee B, the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation is beginning to take applications for the TDEC-ARP Water and Wastewater Infrastructure grant program. Mr. Robinson stated that in order for him to work with utility districts on the county's grant application, the county commission needed to formally agree to an

amount that it would be willing to appropriate as a match toward water projects. Steering Committee B is recommending \$615,000 for this purpose. Mr. White made a motion and Mr. Goff seconded the motion to ask the full County Commission to provide a voice vote in favor of the \$615,000 recommendation for the county's match of the TDEC-ARP grant program. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

After discussion, the next regularly scheduled meeting was set for Monday, May 2, 2022 following the Solid Waste Committee.

Mr. Neal made a motion and Mr. White seconded the motion to adjourn. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Marcum agreed to reach out to the Sheriff's Department and to arrange the presentation. No formal action was taken.

The committee considered a School Federal Projects Fund amendment in the amount of \$95.33 for the Perkins Basic Grant, Subfund 801 for year end cleanup. Mr. White made a motion and Mr. Neal seconded the motion to approve the amendment as presented, contingent upon school board approval. On a voice vote, the motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Robinson asked the committee for any old business: There was none.


NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the White County Commission that:






